COVID-19; PANDEMIC INFORMATION

As of the morning of 11 May 2021, globally, there have been **158,551,526** confirmed cases of COVID-19, including **3,296,855** deaths, reported to WHO. As of 10 May 2021, a total of **1,206,243,409** vaccine doses have been administered.

On 10 May 2021, 49 new confirmed cases were recorded in Nigeria. Till date, **165468** cases have been confirmed, **156318** cases have been discharged and **2065** deaths have been recorded in 36 states and the Federal Capital Territory. **49** new cases are reported from 4 Nigerian states- FCT (27), Lagos (11), Enugu(8), and Oyo (3).

Authorities in Nigeria yesterday, 10 May 2021 announced new COVID-19 restrictions as countries around the world continue to battle the resurgence of the coronavirus. Dr. Mukhtar Mohammed, the National Incident Manager for COVID-19, in a press conference, informed that the new measures come into effect today, 11 May 2021.

As COVID-19 continues to be a part of our daily lives, we must not forget to be alert, adhering to all coronavirus protocols to keep ourselves, family, friends and colleagues safe.

Protect yourself and others from COVID-19.

If COVID-19 is spreading in your community, stay safe by taking some simple precautions, such as physical distancing, wearing a mask, keeping rooms well ventilated, avoiding crowds, cleaning your hands, and coughing into a bent elbow or tissue.

What to do to keep yourself and others safe from COVID-19

- Maintain at least 2-metres distance between yourself and others to reduce your risk of infection when they cough, sneeze or speak. Maintain an even greater distance between yourself and others when indoors. The further away, the better.
- Make wearing a mask a normal part of being around other people. The appropriate use, storage and cleaning or disposal are essential to make masks as effective as possible.

Here are the basics of how to wear a mask:

- Clean your hands before you put your mask on, as well as before and after you take it off, and after you touch it at any time.
- Make sure it covers both your nose, mouth and chin.
- When you take off a mask, store it in a clean plastic bag, and every day either wash it if it's a fabric mask, or dispose of a medical mask in a trash bin.
- Don't use masks with valves.

How to make your environment safer

- Avoid the 3Cs: spaces that are closed, crowded or involve close contact.
 - Outbreaks have been reported in restaurants, choir practices, fitness classes, nightclubs, offices and places of worship where people have gathered, often in crowded indoor settings where they talk loudly, shout, breathe heavily or sing.
 - The risks of getting COVID-19 are higher in crowded and inadequately ventilated spaces where infected people spend long periods of time together in close proximity. These environments are where the virus appears to spread by respiratory droplets or aerosols more efficiently, so taking precautions is even more important.
- Meet people outside. Outdoor gatherings are safer than indoor ones, particularly if indoor spaces are small and without outdoor air coming in.
- Avoid crowded or indoor settings but if you can't, then take precautions:
 - Open a window. Increase the amount of 'natural ventilation' when indoors.
 - Wear a mask.

Don't forget the basics of good hygiene

- Regularly and thoroughly clean your hands with an alcohol-based hand rub or wash them with soap and water. This eliminates germs including viruses that may be on your hands.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose and mouth. Hands touch many surfaces and can pick up viruses. Once contaminated, hands can transfer the virus to your eyes, nose or mouth. From there, the virus can enter your body and infect you.
- Cover your mouth and nose with your bent elbow or tissue when you cough or sneeze. Then dispose of the used tissue immediately into a closed bin and wash your hands. By following good 'respiratory hygiene', you protect the people around you from viruses, which cause colds, flu and COVID-19.
- Clean and disinfect surfaces frequently especially those which are regularly touched, such as door handles, faucets and phone screens.

COVID-19 advice for the public: Getting vaccinated

The world is in the midst of a COVID-19 pandemic. As WHO and partners work together on the response -- tracking the pandemic, advising on critical interventions, distributing vital medical supplies to those in need--- they are racing to develop and deploy safe and effective vaccines.

Vaccines save millions of lives each year. Vaccines work by training and preparing the body's natural defences – the immune system – to recognize and fight off the viruses and bacteria they target. After vaccination, if the body is later exposed to those disease-causing germs, the body is immediately ready to destroy them, preventing illness.

There are several safe and effective vaccines that prevent people from getting seriously ill or dying from COVID-19. This is one part of managing COVID-19, in addition to the main preventive measures of staying at least 1 metre away from others, covering a cough or sneeze in your elbow, frequently cleaning your hands, wearing a mask and avoiding poorly ventilated rooms or opening a window.

As of 8 April 2021, WHO has evaluated that the following vaccines against COVID-19 have met the necessary criteria for safety and efficacy:

- AstraZeneca/Oxford vaccine
- Johnson and Johnson
- Moderna
- Pfizer/BionTech

According to data from Reuters, Nigeria has administered at least **1,665,698** doses of COVID vaccines so far.

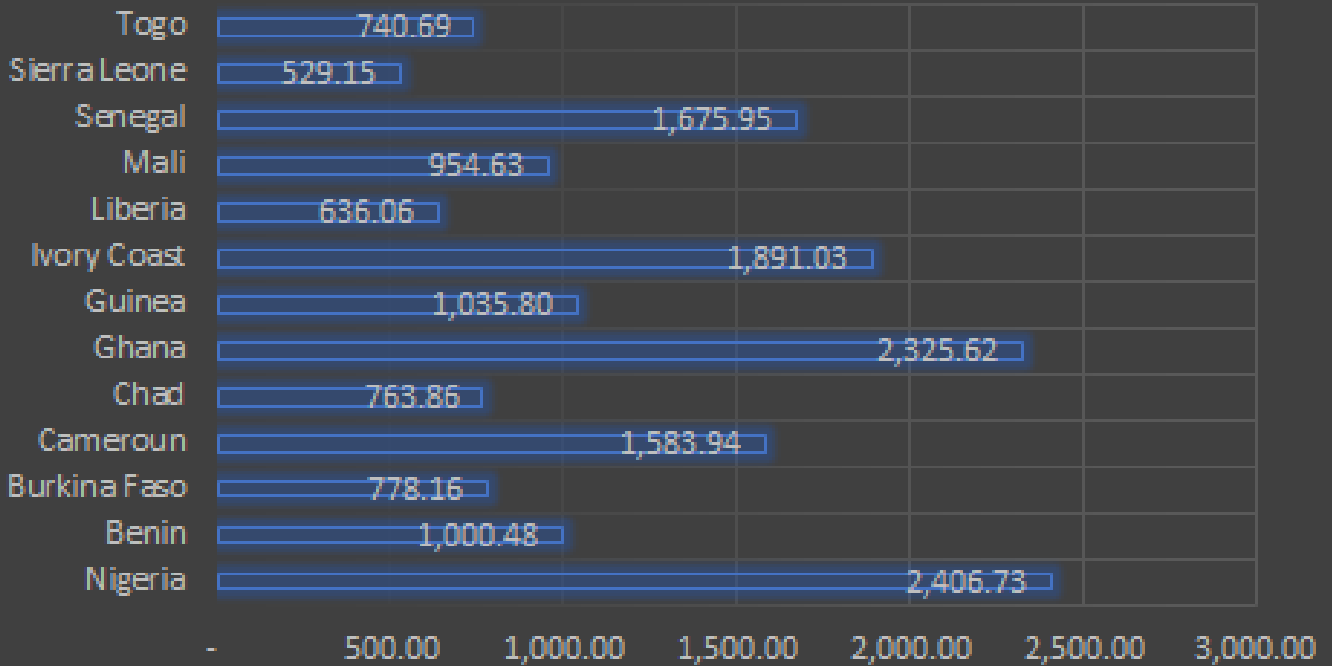

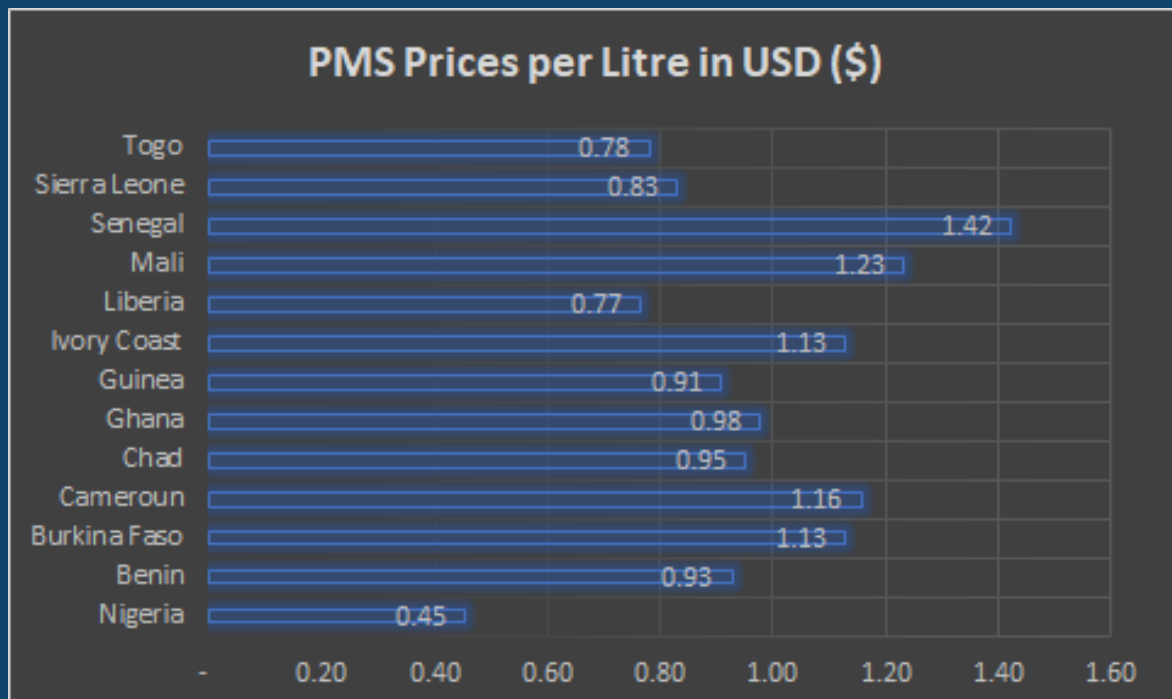
